Especially Th -- and Spidey - but the (gagh) Poor Mouses -oh, the poor readers! Jim Gardner and Paul Rybarczyk had some great art. In spite of all the above comments, I really liked the ish. I have received ODD #11 and after careful perusal have come up with the following LOC:

COVER- Obviously done in desperation. Most of us readers prefer an original gag.

Editorial and Letters- You might have had room for another letter or ad. or capsule editorial if you didn't fill it up by telling us how cramped for space you were.

The Two Major Strips (Head That Wouldn't Die and Stupid Adventures) both by M. Wolfman- I suggest leaving the horror type stories to more seasoned writers like the great author of Castle, Night Visitor, Poor Mouses and countless others; Steve Herring. The hero satire was good even though the 'mask ending' is becoming a bit worn out. Here are a few pointers, however, which may be helpful to the struggling horror satire writer:

I. Don't use automobile accidents as plot hatchers. It's like satirizing the bubonic plague in Medieval England.

II. If you haven't much of a story, make up for it with side plots and subtle innuendo.

III. Never use Hiemy for a shock ending, climax or crux of a story, the ending might at least be original.

Of the rest of the issue, its good points were: Short Shorts, Cover Satires, Mad cover repro (very much like the original) and the Gardner strip on the back cover.

The article on Pornography in Fandom was a bit too deep for me, I found it hard to follow here and there. Wolfman's article along similar lines just proved that Marv Wolfman has a dirty mind, which is nothing profound.

About The Poor Mouses page inside; The first one was rather blaa, I couldn't understand the second, and the third made me throw up.
